
In Memorium

The Birth, Life, and Ultimate Demise of Our "New Library"



THE **ILLINOIS** WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

In 1967 when many of us first arrived on campus, the north side of the IWU Quadrangle (the former site of "Old North and Duration Hall) was a construction site. As Freshman, we watched as massive precast concrete panels arrived on flatbed trailer trucks and were hoisted into place to form the curtain wall of the New Library.


In the summer of 1968, students on campus formed a hand-to-hand "book brigade" to move the majority of the Library book collection from Neo-Romanesque Buck Memorial Library across the Quad into the ultra-modern "New Library," which was later rechristened the "Sheean Library" in honor of a major donor.

The University Librarian, Rodney Ferguson, who oversaw the design of the New Library had a vision. While that vision had many good elements, it reflected and "Age of Aquarius" perhaps understanding of human nature, and did NOT include a secure check-out system at the main exit, so all circulating materials were checked out on the "Honor

System." In the view of some this led to problems when needed items could not be located either in the stacks or in the records of items checked out to individual faculty or students.

What are your memories of our New Library? Do any of these items ring a bell for you:

- Studying, canoodling, or perhaps sleeping in the padded, overheated "Pit" on the lower level;
- The quadrant layout of each floor with the grand open staircase;
- The general lack of outward facing windows;
- The stark modern interior with exposed concrete ceilings and walls;
- ❖ The sculpture display area near the main entrance wherein resided "Arkite." The massive wood sculpture by faculty member Ed McCullough;
- ❖ The controversy over the University's later decision (by a more or less mysterious "Aesthetics Committee" to replace "Arkite" with other artwork;



The protest over the lack of an effective checkout system that took the form of a group of anonymous students overtly removing a great many books in broad daylight without checking them out and then returning them en mass to the landing of the grand staircase in the dark of night?

The Sheean Library is no longer with us. It was replaced by the Ames Library, stood vacant for a few years, and was ultimately razed in 2011 to make way for State Farm Hall. Standing for 43 years and being of real use for considerably less than that, Sheean, did not come close to matching the longevity of its predecessor, Buck Memorial Library, which still graces the campus and will soon be 100 years old.

Serious efforts were made to find new uses for Sheean, but like many modernistic structures built in the 1960s, it was not designed to be particularly flexible or adaptable for new uses and it was horribly energy inefficient. In the final analysis, it was just not a good candidate for preservation or adaptive reuse, unlike Buck, Memorial Gymnasium or even Sherff Hall of Science (now known as the Center for Liberal Arts or "CLA"), which began its life as a "temporary" commercial office building.

Memories of the Dug Out



I loved the Dug Out--(bet you did, too!)

During the first few days on campus in Sept 1967 I was approved for a campus job at the snack bar, which I soon learned was called *the Dug Out*. I worked there for most of my years at IWU and am very glad that I did.

I worked as many hours as were allowed, and often signed up for early Sunday morning hours at the grill and many Friday and Saturday nights until closing hours as most people did not want to work those hours. From taking the orders, to being the short order cook who fried the eggs, made the hamburgers and fries, and scraped the grill at closing; it was also gave me the opportunity to meet so many students at the same time.

At other times when I wasn't working there, it was a welcoming place to meet friends and make new friends. The Dug Out was the hub of campus, and something was always going on there.

Dances were frequent, giving me mixed feelings of anticipation and hesitation, looking over the stair railing from the upstairs lounge, down at the crowd. The Dug Out held senior art shows, lively debates, speakers, combos, pottery sales, and just a chance to find someone to talk to.

I remember walking down the west stairs and hearing Otis Redding singing *Sitting on the Dock of the Bay* on the juke box making me feel melancholy, but very much at home: in the Dug Out.

Living in Pfeiffer Hall meant that I had to cut through the Dug Out to get to the commons for every meal, so it was part of my daily routine, as well as going there for special events and work. When I became a member of Student Senate, I walked through the Dug Out to get to the Sunday night

meetings held in the Davidson Room. The Dug Out connected us all.

Since the 50th Reunion planning began I have wondered when and how the name "the Dug Out" came to be. As the "pit" area of seating and a place for speakers was lower, and "dug out" I thought that must be it. In an effort to answer my question I found many interesting stories.

"the Dug Out" History 1961 -- the new "snack bar" naming contest!

The Student Union Commission has placed a box for entries in the "Name the Snack Bar" contest at the main desk. All entries are due by 7 pm on It ednesday, October 18 a The name will be selected by the Commission.

After finding the above photo, I tracked down one of the people in the news story, Justin Kronewetter 1962 IWU graduate; and he told me by email a few facts. He was one of the 1961 winners of the contest! He recalls a \$100 prize that was divided among the 3 winners. The name was

selected by the Student Union Commission from student submitted entries. Justin said "The name was obvious given the fact that the hillside adjacent to the Memorial Building had to be excavated (dug out) for the necessary construction. Simple as that. There was nothing more than a patio on the site prior to excavation and construction. The patio was an extension of the cafeteria which was located on the bottom floor of the Memorial Union." The news photo suggests a drawing for the name, but the Student Union Commission decided the name from the entries.

More on the Dug Out's History

1961 Oct Argus – full page promotion with photos: "with Lounge, recreation center, HI-FI Room and Roof Garden are available for your enjoyment. Every Friday afternoon "Jazz Unlimited. East end of lounge area furnished with bridge tables for Wesleyan card players. Billiard table in the downstairs game room as well as ping pong tables, comfortable chairs of modern décor in lounge."

1962 Jan -- controversy: displaying Greek house paddles on the Dug Out panels, causing a roll call vote in Student Senate and the consideration of an all-school vote on the subject.

1962 April 13 – a letter to the editor: questioning banning cigarette ads in the Argus while having a cigarette machine still in the Dug Out

1962 Nov -- Dug Out improved innovations; candles on each table Fri & Sat night to create a different atmosphere, free popcorn evenings. Entertainment planned; guitar players, folk singers, pianists. The Argus noted that "if students persist in taking the new candles, they will have to be removed."

1963 Wesleyana -- 5 photos of a combo (musical group) playing music, cardplayers, billiard player, conversations at Dug Out tables, and a great crowd photo of a packed Dug Out with the comment: Look for me in the Dug Out (sound familiar?!)

1964 Wesleyana -- mentions Dug Out as part of student social life from card games to Friday night combos

1967-1971 -- our years: musical groups, debates, speakers, dates, snacks & hamburgers, hanging out, occasional studying, Earth Day speakers, juke box music, discussions on the meaning of life and college, and work-study in the grill for some of us

1968 June 2 Pantagraph – reports on the student pageant honoring IWU President Bertholf's retirement had 2 of 4 scenes in the Dug Out

1968 Nov 22 Argus -- there are 32 student workers in the Dug Out, issues of rising costs and IWU wanting to limit their work hours to 20 per week though some students wanted to work up to 30. Rising costs and Dug Out income was down \$1000 during Sept/Oct as compared to same time last year, but Dug Out is still breaking even.

1970 fall -- students were paid \$1.60/ hour

1971 May 3 Pantagraph -- Inter Hall Week Friday night horror movie night in Dug Out: The Blob, Tomb of Legeia, and Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte

1993-94 -- Oh No! Dug Out completely remodeled, pit filled in and floor leveled (photo 1994 Wesleyana p.19), the food service moved to the other side, a new floor plan,

2013 -- still more renovations to the Dug Out.

LOOK AGAIN at the sign on the walls of the Dug Out through the years!

When I started gathering the history of the Dug Out in

early 2021, noticed the "t" in "the" is different from the style for the rest of the name -- slightly separate. taller. and sometimes at an angle or a different font. This "t" resembles a cross in the signage.



This would make sense as IWU has a Methodist affiliation.

The name on the wall has moved and changed some through the years, but in all the pictures I found the "t" still looks like a cross each time. But the current (2022) sign no longer has the distinctly cross-like "t".

Tickets will be \$1 for IWU students and \$1.50 for the pub-




I have evidence that clears us, and I will have it with me at our 50.5 Reunion.


